A LETTER FROM LEADERSHIP

Dear friends in mission,

Since its founding, Methodism has held at its center a focus on social holiness. Care that is not confined within the walls of a church, compassion that extends beyond the borders of a community.

This outward focus on the well-being of others has defined Methodist mission for centuries. Since 1819, missionaries have witnessed to the presence of God in Jesus Christ in new places, establishing churches and accompanying new Christians in their faith journeys. Global crises like war, famine and flood have prompted swift and bold action for those in time of great need regardless of nationality, race or religion. The forerunner of UMCOR – the Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief (MCO) – was founded in 1940 on these principles.

Year after year, decade after decade, what sustains the faith-driven, far-reaching, life-changing mission of Methodism?

God's grace.

In 2022, the presence of God's grace was clear. It enlivens the pages of this report and enabled Global Ministries and UMCOR, on behalf of United Methodists all around the world, to continue extending the reach of care and compassion. Without God's grace, we would not have so quickly assisted in aiding Ukrainian refugees with food, shelter and psychosocial support. We would not have commissioned 54 missionaries gathering for commissioning events in regional hubs like Northern Ireland and Costa Rica. We would not have helped reduce the number of deaths from malaria, cholera and COVID-19, nor partnered in the revitalization of 13 health facilities in which to treat and prevent such diseases. And we would not have supported the flourishing of 27 new faith communities in Africa, Central America and Southeast Asia.

As the church's sustaining source of mission, God's grace goes before us, is always teaching and reshaping us, and will continue to guide us. God's grace has been our foundation and it is our source of hope for the future.

In your support of mission, know that you are a vessel for God's grace. Thank you for partnering in the ever-changing movement, yet constant presence of God.

HUMANITARIAN RELIEF AND RECOVERY

Global Ministries seeks to strengthen churches and communities to respond to disasters and provide humanitarian relief locally and globally. The core of this work is accomplished through the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) as disaster relief and recovery, risk-reduction programming, addressing the needs and rights of migrants worldwide and improving livelihoods and food security. The intentional care of creation and advancing environmental sustainability also reduces the impact of disaster.

GLOBAL HEALTH

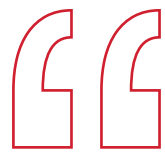

WAR RELIEF FOR UKRAINE

The United Methodist Committee on Relief began relief operations in Ukraine shortly after Russian forces invaded the country, thanks in large part to the compassionate response of many thousands of church members around the world, including members in bordering countries who opened their doors to refugees from Ukraine.

United Methodists have indeed found the grace to help in times of need. Gifts toward humanitarian relief and recovery in Ukraine to date total \$27.3 million. UMCOR has distributed millions of dollars to partners working to provide direct relief in Ukraine as well as to churches and other organizations caring for war refugees in neighboring countries, including the U.S. through Church World Service (CWS).

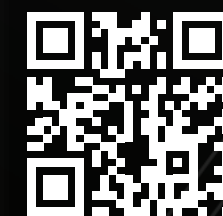

SHELTER MINISTRIES IN BALTI, MOLDOVA

At the Church World Service (CWS) refugee hub in Balti, Moldova, refugees can pick up food and hygiene supplies, get medical or mental health support and connect to other available services. Through the UMCOR-CWS partnership, 20,000 Ukrainian refugees are being reached and resettled in Moldova, creating safety and opportunity for the refugees and relieving some of the burden on Moldovan communities.

ACCOMPANYING THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH IN UKRAINE

In June 2022, staff from UMCOR and United Methodist Communications and Bishop Christian Alsted, of the Nordic and Baltic Episcopal Area, which now includes Ukraine, visited mission and relief sites in Ukraine and in surrounding countries hosting refugees. Meeting face-to-face with partners and beneficiaries deepened relationships and enabled UMCOR to authorize support for more relief and recovery work and extend projects with partners who had built the capacity to do so.

HUMANITARIAN RELIEF AND RECOVERY

RELIEF AND LEGAL HELP FOR REFUGEES OUTSIDE UKRAINE

The ACT Alliance, headquartered in Geneva, has been working with several alliance members in Ukraine, Hungary, Poland and Romania to help communities accommodate displaced people and refugees who have crossed borders to escape the violence and destruction in their home communities. Joining in the response, UMCOR accompanies four church organizations working to provide basic services and other support.

REMOVING UNEXPLODED BOMBS AND TEACHING PEOPLE HOW TO FIND THEM

In August 2022, UMCOR turned to a long-time partner Mines Advisory Group (MAG) to fund removal of unexploded ordnance, which now endangers most of the country, and to offer instruction and education to local communities in how to recognize and avoid mines and other dangerous explosives. MAG also trains local candidates in demining and works alongside local municipalities. Their goal is 100% of landmines and explosive ordnance found and destroyed.

A COMPLETELY MOBILE BAKERY

With partner International Blue Crescent (IBC), UMCOR funding made possible a mobile bakery in Ukraine – a bakery and food distribution center in a tractor-trailer rig that can be moved to areas of greatest need, providing fresh bread and emergency food rations.

The mobile bakery is complete with a dining area that allows war-weary people a chance to sit down to a meal. The bakery provides daily bread and food rations for 9,000 internally displaced people.

HELPING FAMILIES SURVIVE IN AFGHANISTAN

In February 2022, after the U.S. military withdrawal from Afghanistan, UMCOR approved a grant for International Blue Crescent (IBC) to extend its humanitarian operations to include 8,100 more people in need of food and hygiene supplies. IBC conducted two monthly distributions, working with the Afghan Red Crescent, for food rations, including basmati rice, red beans, cooking oil, sugar, salt, pasta, green tea and tomato paste.

HURRICANE DORIAN RECOVERY IN BAHAMAS

An UMCOR partnership with the nonprofit agency IsraAid addressed chronic problems with saltwater contamination of freshwater water sources on Abaco and Grand Bahama. IsraAid worked on a sustainable groundwater management program focused on community engagement, training and building the professional capacity of Bahamian workers employed by the water authorities of both islands. The project also improved the water and sanitation infrastructure on the ground. Beneficiaries of the program include more than 52,000 residents of Grand Bahama and 18,000 residents of Abaco.

HAITI EARTHQUAKE RECOVERY

Many families in Haiti are still living in makeshift tents after the 2021 earthquake destroyed their dwellings and much of their livelihoods. UMCOR continues to support partners like Habitat for Humanity International, to build more resilient housing in Les Cayes.

In other areas, UMCOR is extending basic food relief and food security with the Methodist Church of Haiti.

FAMINE RELIEF IN THE EASTERN HORN OF AFRICA

UMCOR supported relief efforts in Somalia, Ethiopia and Sudan, to alleviate hunger brought on by a severe drought in the region. UMCOR partnered with Kaalmo Relief Development (KRD) for food relief of 500 displaced families in the Beled-Hawa District Camp, supplying food vouchers to meet their short-term nutritional needs. A grant released to the United Methodist Church of Ethiopia provided food, water, sanitation, hygiene and other essential items in the Gambela region, which experienced civil unrest and loss of life in June.

HURRICANE FIONA IN PUERTO RICO

REHACE (Rebuilding Communities with Hope), the social service agency of the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico, maintains a strong working relationship with UMCOR, which helped them with emergency response efforts in the first three weeks after Fiona, providing more than 8,400 individuals with 3,370 bags of groceries. Fifty communities were impacted by this effort achieved with 1,298 volunteer hours.

FLOOD RESPONSE IN KENTUCKY, MISSISSIPPI, PENNSYLVANIA AND ALABAMA

Major flooding from Hurricane Ida engulfed towns in Eastern Pennsylvania several days after the storm passed. A large grant from UMCOR allowed the conference to develop a ministry of flood recovery with case management services and reconstruction and repair teams.

Conference Early Response Teams and Disaster Response ministries responded to other flooding events as well as hurricanes and tornadoes with UMCOR's help in 2022. UMCOR funded major relief and recovery efforts in the Kentucky, Mississippi, Pennsylvania and Alabama-West Florida conferences.

MUSTARD SEED MIGRATION GRANTS FOR LOCAL CHURCHES

Local churches in the U.S. reached out into their communities to provide services, supplies or a listening ear to welcome migrants and refugees in their midst. In 2022, 37 U.S. churches were awarded Mustard Seed Migration Grants.

Wesley Memorial UMC in Charlottesville, Virginia, has provided sanctuary to Maria Shavalan Sut since 2018. Through an UMCOR Mustard Seed Migration Grant, the church was able to help Maria, an Indigenous Mayan woman who fled Guatemala in 2015, launch a catering business and become more financially stable and self-sufficient.

“María’s presence at the church has been transformative for many in the congregation. It is powerful for people to connect the dots between the ways in which we have loved her and the ways that she loves and nourishes us.”

EARTHKEEPERS COHORT TRAININGS CONTINUED ONLINE

Global Ministries' Environmental Sustainability program trained 38 new EarthKeepers in three sessions.

EarthKeepers is a training program that equips US-based United Methodists to launch and grow environmental projects in their communities. Topics include eco-theology, antiracism, community organizing and project planning.

LET THERE BE LIGHT – EVEN AFTER THE WORST OF STORMS

Global Ministries pioneered new ways of equipping conference Early Response Teams with solar-powered systems to provide much-needed energy when the electrical grids are down. One system is even mounted on mobile emergency response vans to provide quick and easy service.



In the early days following Hurricane Ian, Charlotte County Emergency Management used this temporary microgrid at Port Charlotte UMC in Port Charlotte, Florida, to support ambulance triage. The equipment was delivered to the church with help from the Florida Conference, UMCOR and the Footprint Project.

TRAINING AND GROWING ARE EMPHASIZED IN AGRICULTURE INITIATIVE

In the fall of 2022, the Yambasu Agriculture Initiative held training sessions for representative farmers and church leaders conducting Yambasu Agriculture Initiative projects at the Songhai training center in Benin. Sessions were held in three different language groups, French, Portuguese and English. Many immediately began to make changes in their agriculture practices once they returned home. The fruits of this training will continue to grow in years to come.

New agricultural missionaries have been called to serve in Africa, some of whom are working to help communities with YAI projects. Blair Moses Kamanga, from Zambia, conducts agriculture training and projects in Mozambique and Edmond Makowa, from Zimbabwe, is the agriculture coordinator for the East Congo Conference in the DRC.

Nana Kutela Fatuma is an agriculturist in West Angola and her husband, Kutela Katembo, serves the East Angola Conference. Lorraine Charinda is director of the Kamisamba farm in North Katanga, DRC. John N'Day serves in Mozambique as agricultural director at Combina Mission, and Temba Nkomozepi directs the Mujila Falls Agriculture Center in Zambia.

LEANING ON THE GRACE OF GOD

United Methodist missionaries recognized God's grace in their ability to move around their communities again after pandemic restrictions slowly lifted. More were able to travel to their mission placements, serve in their communities and gather with other missionaries. As a relatively new missionary, Blair Moses Kamanga explained, missionaries who are not able to move about and connect with people because of COVID-19 lockdowns, especially when they have just arrived in a new country, have to work extra hard to overcome the challenges.

Church and Community Workers came together for their biennial meeting, in a virtual setting, in February, while Global Mission Fellows were able to meet in Côte d'Ivoire for in-person training. Mission volunteers were still training online in 2022, but then traveling to mission sites for placement.

PLANTING CHURCHES IN NEW ENGLAND

The Rev. Juarez Goncalves, a missionary from Brazil, began to work among the Brazilian diaspora in Boston, Massachusetts, in 2000.

In the 20 years that the Goncalves family has lived and worked in the United States, they have coordinated the planting of seven churches in the New England Conference, branching out from Family UMC in Saugus. They have also developed ways to train Portuguese-speaking local pastors to lead the new congregations.

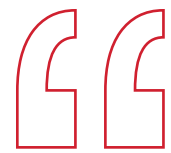
In 2022, 54 missionaries were commissioned for service in nine different worship services taking place around the world from April to July.

By the grace of God, new faith communities have taken root in the world as people encounter the gospel message and experience the love of Christ through missionaries and lay people and other messengers of God.

Global Ministries acknowledges that God is actively working in the world and that, on behalf of the church, we follow where God leads as God defines our mission. Each new faith community experiences the grace of God and seeks to spread the message of love and reconciliation through Christ.

The United Methodist Church in Mongolia, a mission initiative established in 2002 by Global Ministries, welcomed a new country director in 2022, the Rev. Dexter Ceballos, a missionary from the Philippines. United Methodists in Mongolia continue to grow in numbers but also in ministries of service, opening a new hospice center in 2022. Key to the development of mission initiatives are training and resourcing of new church leadership.

CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION PROVIDE BETTER HEALTH

Global Health provided grants for Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) in three additional rural settings in Côte d'Ivoire, drilling wells and providing pump houses that operate on solar-powered systems, continuing work begun in 2021.

FIGHTING CHOLERA IN NORTH KATANGA

Cholera is an opportunistic water-borne disease that often surfaces after catastrophic flooding or storms. Though preventable, it can be very deadly and constantly re-infects populations in the wake of disasters. A grant provided help with education and treatment for cholera in North Katanga in a lake-district area where the disease was spreading in 2022.

PROVIDING LIFE-GIVING MEDICINES AND SUPPLIES TO UKRAINE

Global Ministries Global Health program through UMCOR partnered with the Arlene Campbell Humanitarian Foundation, a Texas-based humanitarian organization focused on Ukraine, and Ohio Health to send three shipments of medical supplies and equipment worth to three hospitals in Kyiv, Ukraine. UMCOR paid specific costs, including transportation, of approximately \$160,000.

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

REVENUE

GENERAL BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

The total operating revenue for 2022 of \$46.1 million increased by 9.1%, or \$3.8 million when compared to 2021. Advance giving increased \$15.7%, or \$1.2 million over the prior year.

Bequest giving also increased by \$1.3 million in 2022 concluding at \$1.5 million. The World Service apportionment collection rate increased slightly from 72.5% for 2021 to 73.8% in 2022, resulting in a nominal increase of \$238,000 in revenue.

Shared costs reimbursements from UMCOR were up by \$379,000 as our overall agency costs increased slightly in 2022.

UMCOR

Revenue for 2022 was impacted significantly by the strong response to the conflict caused by the Russian invasion of Ukraine.

Giving through the International Disaster Response Advance for this cause raised over \$27 million in 2022, bolstering overall operating revenues to \$63.9 million. This resulted in an overall increase in operating revenue from the prior year of \$29 million. Giving toward United States Disaster Response and Where Most Needed Advances remained consistent with 2021 levels.

The Global Ministries Board of Directors approved a grant in May 2022 in the amount of \$2.5 million to address future health programming initiatives, which will be administered through the Global Health unit.

EXPENDITURES

GENERAL BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

Operating expenditures for 2022 concluded at \$42.5 million, which was up from \$35.3 million in 2021, resulting in an increase of \$7.3 million or 20.6%. Granting in 2022 increased compared to 2021, with the Yambasu Agriculture Initiative receiving almost \$3 million in funding. The Yambasu Agriculture Initiative goals are to create more food security and income production through local African churches and annual conferences using existing church lands.

Support services costs concluded at \$10.2 million in 2022, which was an increase of \$605,000, or 6.3%.

UMCOR

UMCOR operating expenditures for 2022 increased dramatically, spurred mostly by increased granting through both International Disaster and U.S. Disaster Response granting.

Total operating expenditures for 2022 concluded at \$58.9 million, an increase of \$36.1 million from 2021. Almost \$17 million in Advance granting was released to support direct and indirect impacts of the Ukraine invasion.

Overall granting through the Advance increased by \$32.1 million, compared to 2021, in support of recovery efforts throughout the world. Global Health spending increased from \$4.4 million in 2021 to \$8.1 million in 2022, with additional focus on Health System Strengthening, primarily in Africa.

A \$2 million grant was approved through the Harry Kendall fund to support renovation of the Philander Smith College Allied Public Health School.

NET ASSETS

GENERAL BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

Total Net Assets for Global Ministries concluded at \$322.8 million, a decrease of \$49.8 million. The primary reason for the net asset decrease is unrealized losses for investments, a result of rapid inflation impacting market returns.

UMCOR

Total Net Assets for UMCOR concluded at \$92.1 million, a decrease of \$9.8 million. This decrease was also a result of unrealized investment losses.
